

The Pastors Voice

Silence in the grand scheme of things Are there spiritual benefits to silence – Sacred Scripture says yes

Putting aside time for silence with God helps us to grow spiritually, especially when it comes to humility. It's not the silence that creates the growth, but the time spent with the Lord in that silence.

As Christians, we must remember that silence is integral to our faith. Put another way, to omit or neglect silence in our life of faith harms our spiritual integrity. The example of Our Lord alone shows us his desire to go off and pray in silence. His forty days in the dessert, his retreats to silent areas, his praying in Gethsemane, all provide us with example after example of our own need to disconnect from our electronic devises and simply, passively listen. To what? To the hush of wind, the far off songs of birds or the salty roar of the surf—to our thoughts, and God's voice within them. Jesus shows us that it is important to take time each day for silent prayer. "Very early next morning," we read in the Gospel, "he got up and went out" (Mark 1:35). Moreover, "He went away to a lonely spot and remained there in prayer" (Mark 1:36). If our Lord thought it good to awake very early and be alone in prayer, we ought to take notice. Silence is the context of prayer.

"Prayer of Inner Quiet." One of the richest forms of prayer can occur when the heart is absolutely quiet. As the psalmist says, "Be still and know that I am God" (Psalm 46:10). If you still your mind, you can hear your own heart. And at the core of your heart is the indwelling of God, it's a matter of just being there.

Similar to the "Prayer of Inner Quiet" is what we might call the "Prayer of Listening." In this prayer, the focus is on listening to God, who reveals himself in our inmost being. You listen at the core of your being to the deepest voice of all, the voice of God and of the Spirit. Thomas Merton describes this kind of prayer as "finding one's deepest center, awakening the profound depths of our being in the presence of God, who is the source of our being and life."

You may find it rewarding to try this simple prayer exercise:

Just sit down and, keeping your back straight but free, begin quieting your mind and your body by taking a few relaxing, deep breaths. Close your eyes if you wish. Center your awareness on the silent and infinite presence of God within your heart.

Let the Spirit lead you beyond the noisy world of space and time and into the silent realm where God dwells as the source and ground of your being. Center your attention on that hushed point within you where the human touches the divine, where the branch (you) intersects with Jesus, the vine—where you and God are one and dwell in each other.

Let yourself sink into the silent immensity of God. Simply let your prayer be a silent *being there* with God. Without any need for thoughts and words, exchange quiet love with God for as long as you feel inspired to do so.
